From Fr. Tom Fitzpatick: In two weeks, many of our Pastorate children will receive their First Holy Communion. Their teachers and parents are busy preparing them very well for this day, and it promises to be a joyous day for many. This is a happy time of the year, when we can more confidently trust that winter is behind us and events like First Holy Communion, Mother's Day, graduations, and the end of the school year reassure us that we have a full Summer ahead of us. These traditional events mark rites of passage, as well as reaffirming our gratitude for the people in our lives that help us to enjoy the gifts of God.

We also celebrate a Tradition each time we participate in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. This though is a tradition with a capital "T". The three-legged stool of our Catholic faith is Scripture. Tradition. and Magisterium. Scripture as we know, is the inspired word of God that is the foundation for all we know and trust concerning knowledge of God, His interaction with us through time, and the works of Christ. Magisterium is the teaching authority of the Church as exercised through time, especially by Popes and Bishops. It is through the Magisterium that our theology developed, and the laws of the Church that organically grew through the witness of Scripture and our understanding of God through time.

Tradition is positioned as the second leg of the stool, and a reassurance that our faith, especially in Christ's true presence in the Eucharist and the structure of Holy Mass itself, can be traced back to the earliest days of the Church, as evidenced by this explanation by St. Justin Martyr around the year 140AD. From the time of the Apostles onward, the core of our faith has been constant, especially in the way we express these truths liturgically. This passage from his famous Apologia is very interesting, in that it precisely explains the very Mass we celebrate today:

From the first apology in defense of the Christians by St. Justin, martyr:

"No one may share the Eucharist with us unless he believes that what we teach is true, unless he is washed in the regenerating waters of baptism for the remission of his sins, and unless he lives in accordance with the principles given us by Christ.

We do not consume the eucharistic bread and wine as if it were ordinary food and drink, for we have been taught that as Jesus Christ our Savior became a man of flesh and blood by the power of the Word of God, so also the food that our flesh and blood assimilates for its nourishment becomes the flesh and blood of the

incarnate Jesus by the power of his own words contained in the prayer of thanksgiving.

The apostles, in their recollections, which are called gospels, handed down to us what Jesus commanded them to do. They tell us that he took bread, gave thanks and said: Do this in memory of me. This is my body. In the same way he took the cup, he gave thanks and said: This is my blood. The Lord gave this command to them alone. Ever since then we have constantly reminded one another of these things. The rich among us help the poor and we are always united. For all that we receive we praise the Creator of the universe through his Son Jesus Christ and through the Holy Spirit.

On Sunday we have a common assembly of all our members, whether they live in the city or the outlying districts. The recollections of the apostles or the writings of the prophets are read, as long as there is time. When the reader has finished, the president of the assembly speaks to us; he urges everyone to imitate the examples of virtue we have heard in the readings. Then we all stand up together and pray.

On the conclusion of our prayer, bread and wine and water are brought forward. The president offers prayers and gives thanks to the best of his ability, and the people give assent by saying, "Amen." The eucharist is distributed, everyone present communicates, and the deacons take it to those who are absent.

The wealthy, if they wish, may make a contribution, and they themselves decide the amount. The collection is placed in the custody of the president, who uses it to help the orphans and widows and all who for any reason are in distress, whether because they are sick, in prison, or away from home. In a word, he takes care of all who are in need.

We hold our common assembly on Sunday because it is the first day of the week, the day on which God put darkness and chaos to flight and created the world, and because on that same day our Savior Jesus Christ rose from the dead. For he was crucified on Friday and on Sunday he appeared to his apostles and disciples and taught them the things that we have passed on for your consideration."

The beauty of Sacred Liturgy finds its origin in Christ Himself. As children of God, we seek to reflect this beauty in our souls and actions. By adhering as best we can to the timelessness of Christ Himself, we remember we are part of something that is eternal and true. This is why we approach Holy Mass with reverence and awe, part of the unbroken chain of believers who follow Him and trust in His abiding presence to the flock we call our Catholic Church.


